Headteacher's update

Dear Parents/ Carers,

Many thanks for all your support this term where we have had lots of changes within the school. We have had new staff and students start this term as well as moving to the new building in Seale Hayne (East Wing.) The students have settled into their new classrooms and the school has changed from just a building into somewhere the students feel comfortable and part of. West Yarner has also seen some changes with new students arriving and extra space being available, although we have more new students arriving, hopefully in the new year.

A massive thank you to everyone in the school (staff, students and parents who completed the question-naire) for making Ofsted feel so welcome on their visit in the second week of term. Even though we were only less than two weeks in the Seale Hayne building, Ofsted could see what we are trying to achieve and how the ethos is linked to the already great provision we are providing at West Yarner.

There have been some excellent activities this term with a trip to the pantomime, a class visit to Bygones in Torquay and the Dartmoor Prison Museum. Forest School continues to be a positive experience for some students. Intervention activities have included a lot of swimming, the zoo, art and cooking which links to, not only their EHCP targets but also the wider curriculum.

Lisa Chell (Forest School Leader) is reducing her hours to two days which will mean we have to rethink the Forest School timetable.

Have a lovely time over the Christmas holidays and we will see everyone on the 4th January.

Forest School Development

This term we continued to use our forest school site at Burchetts wood.

During the Forest School sessions the students have been working on different styles of den building. Some of them used ropes and tarpaulins to create ridgeline shelters and hanging tipi style shelters. Others have used things they have found in the woods and we now have an amazing log lean to shelter that has graced our site all term. Also under



construction is a traditional 'bender' shelter made from harvested hazel poles that are sunk into the ground then bent over to form a domed structure. There is still more to do to this but once the framework is finished we will cover it with tarpaulin and it will hopefully provide a warmish dry space in our woodland camp!

The students have also been revisiting their fire building skills, and a few of them have made their own individual fires and kept them going long enough to cook on. We have cooked amongst other things bread twists, cake and pizza.

As always whittling and woodcraft have been popular and the students have been coming up with some imaginative ideas of things to make. My favourites this term were a racing car and a Harry Potter wand with extra magic through the addition of a phoenix feather!







Trips and Visits

Year 7 B trip

In the first part of the term, Year 7 were learning about the Victorian time period.

They linked their in class learning with a trip to Bygones, which is an independent attraction, run by three generations of the Cumming family. It allowed the children to explore sights, sounds and smells of Victorian England with a stroll down an authentic Victorian street, looking at different shops filled with original Victorian merchandise.

After returning to school, the children produced diary entries based on their class trip as well as discussed historical knowledge gained during the trip.

For Halloween this year, the students took a trip to our local pumpkin farm just off of the A38 - Devon Pumpkin Picking.

Upon arrival in a very muddy field, wellies were donned and brightly coloured wheelbarrows were collected for us to start our hunt for the perfect carvable pumpkin.

With over 16 varieties to choose from, including Polar Bear, Porcelain Doll and Goosebump pumpkins, our trip took around an hour, wandering around the huge field to pick our favourites.

Upon returning to school, the smell of pumpkin flesh filled the rooms and corridors as students began emptying and carving their designs. The students enjoyed cooking and eating pumpkin soup and pumpkin tarts.

They also developed a range of carving and cutting techniques along side developing their social skills.

While on interventions this term, some of our students have been learning to cast and fish in both lakes and sea. One of the Year 8 students was lucky enough to catch two large carp on his first ever fishing session. The activity exceeded expectations in every way and he was excited to go again as soon as possible. He tried out sea-fishing the next week, and combined his love of cooking by bringing back to school a gar fish to make tasty goujons! Another child also joined in on the fun and caught three fish on his first attempt!.







Trips and Visits

Year 7 trip to Dartmoor Prison

This year in KS 3 we are going to focus on developing the children's understanding of different jobs in the community and different career pathways the children may follow.

On Thursday Y7 visited the Dartmoor Prison Museum in Princetown linking it to their Crime and Punishment history topic. After an informative and entertaining welcome from the Museum curator, the children enjoyed seeing how the prison has changed since opening as a Prisoner of War facility in 1809. They were particularly interested in the contraband seized over the years and the replica cells - one student was surprised by how comfy the beds were! The children learnt about different jobs within the prison and the importance of prison officers in our society.





Careers—Police officer's visit.

Continuing developing the children's understanding of careers in our society, we invited a Police officer to talk to our children. He talked about his training, shifts patterns responsibilities and different aspects of his job.

Next term, we are expecting a range of professionals to visit Seale Hayne/West Yarner and will talk about their jobs and responsibilities — South West Water service, Air ambulance, RNLI team.
